Rich in History - Continuing the Tradition

In 1870 the Metropolitan Museum and the Boston Museum of Fine Arts opened their doors. William Wadsworth Findlay opened his gallery "City Art Rooms" in Kansas City, Missouri in the very same year.

In 1919, the founder's eldest son, Walstein C. Findlay Sr. became President of the company. He was responsible for bringing European art such as 18th and 19th Century English landscapes and portraits, German genre paintings, French Impressionist and Barbizon paintings to the gallery's collection.

A third generation was added in the 1920's when Walstein C. Findlay Jr. (Wally), joined the company broadening the galleries' vision even further. Becoming the "known" cultural oasis in Kansas and following a substantial growth, Findlay Galleries established its Chicago location in 1932. Today, the galleries are recognized as the third oldest in the United States.

The galleries began a dramatic expansion and, in 1961, opened the Palm Beach Gallery, today, the oldest gallery in the state of Florida. Later, in 1964, the galleries expanded their presence north to New York City, followed by the Paris location in 1971. The same year, "Wally" established a presence on the West Coast in Beverly Hills, and by 1974, a handsome 5,000 square foot gallery was prominent on Rodeo Drive.

Wally Findlay Galleries 140 year history has naturally reflected the various "schools" of art of each period, from Impressionist during the 1870's to Fauvism in the early 20th Century, through subsequent contemporary movements. Besides specializing in French Impressionist, Post-Impressionist, and modern masters, the gallery has developed a group of distinguished contemporary artists, worldwide, which are represented exclusively. Wally Findlay Galleries is considered one of the foremost authorities on the French School of Rouen, Normandie and École de Paris.

As a dealer to individuals, institutions and corporate collectors alike, Wally Findlay Galleries International, through its gallery locations, identifies and promotes artists with extraordinary ability in their respective mediums. This ability must be present in their expressive and technical skills, and in the ability to portray solid stylistic nuances and visual languages.




